## How to Help Patients with Modality Decision-making

These suggestions are excerpted from "Strategies for Improving Dialysis Decision Making" by Anne Campbell, and published in **Peritoneal Dialysis International**, Vol.11, pp 173-178, 1991.

- Get to know the patient. The time spent will pay off in the long run.
- **Inquire about patients' existing dialysis information**. Determine the source, so you can address misinformation and biases upfront.
- **Set up a framework for your discussions**. It helps patients to know why & how you'll be talking about dialysis.
- Use only one educator. A single source of information builds patient rapport and maintains consistency.
- Conduct separate education sessions for different modalities. Improves comprehension and reduces bias.
- Try to link dialysis education with previous learning. Connections strengthen learning.
- Allow enough time. Early education promotes understanding, more costeffective outpatient procedures (for accesses and catheters) and better decisionmaking.
- Always present BOTH hemo and PD. Patients need to know there are options.
- **Discuss pros and cons of each treatment thoroughly**. Have patients make their own lists to ensure they can visualize real differences.
- Ask patients to "try on" each type of dialysis. This exercise makes the decision more pragmatic.
- **Desensitize when anxiety is high**. Patients will be better prepared to start therapy.
